

# HONORED IN DEATH

## FUNERAL OF LATE ARTHUR TWIDDLE IS IMPRESSIVE.

Sermon Is Preached by Rev. G. R. Geer, of Grace Methodist Church. Fine Tribute Is Paid to Man That Dies at Post of Duty—Firemen From Each of City Halls Act as Pall Bearers.

The obsequies of the late Arthur Twiddle, the second victim of the fire truck accident on Lake avenue, were held yesterday afternoon from the residence of his parents, at 700 Twenty-first avenue West.

The funeral arrangements were carried out in much the same manner as those of the other dead fireman, Archibald Finlayson. A detachment of police and firemen and a delegation from the United Order of Foresters, headed by the City band, marched from No. 2 fire hall yesterday afternoon to the dwelling.

Owing to the limited room in the house the firemen were unable to attend the services and they remained outside until their conclusion. The house was completely filled with friends of the dead fireman and as many more were compelled to remain outside, all anxious, however, to pay a last tribute of respect to a man that died at his post of duty.

The services were conducted by Rev. G. R. Geer, pastor of Grace Methodist church, and they were very impressive. The preacher paid a fine tribute to the dead fireman, saying that the heroism of firemen in saving property and lives is as great as that shown on the battlefield. Music was furnished by a mixed quartet consisting of Mrs. Hopkins, Mrs. Haun, Miss Hopkins and Mrs. Shonberg.

At the conclusion of the services the casket was opened and all that wished were permitted to view the face of the departed. After the room was cleared the detachment of police and firemen filed slowly through the room and took a last look at the face of their dead comrade and friend. The casket was then tenderly placed on hose wagon No. 2, by six comrades of the dead fireman, who acted as pall bearers.

The hose wagon was draped in deep black and the casket was placed amid the folds of the national colors. Surmounting the casket were beautiful floral offerings. The body was escorted to Fortieth avenue West by the details of firemen and police, where carriages were taken for Onota cemetery.

The pall bearers were six firemen, one from each fire hall in the city. Lieut. Cameron and Fireman Warren, the two firemen that were on the truck the morning the fatal collision happened, attended the funeral. Cameron and Warren have not yet recovered from their injuries and were driven to the funeral in a carriage.

Assistant Chief Frink, of Superior, in command of a delegation of Superior firemen, also attended the funeral.
